Understanding safety culture

A safety culture is an organisational culture that places a high level of importance on safety beliefs, values and attitudes—and these are shared by the majority of people within the company or workplace It can be characterised as ‘the way we do things around here’ A positive safety culture can result in improved workplace health and

IMPLEMENTING An effective SAFETY CULTURE

In other words, with an effective safety culture, safety and pollution prevention are always the highest priority The company and its staff will always, and automatically, think about the implications for safety of every action, rather than simply following safety procedures because they have been imposed from outside In an effective safety

DEVELOPING EFFECTIVE SAFETY CULTURE - DEFINE

Developing Effective Safety Culture is not a Safety function alone It is a project Management function A positive safety culture refers to an environment where everyone is sensitive and aware of the needs of others; trust and cooperation is prevalent; and a proactive approach to solving problems is adopted

An effective safety culture cannot be measured through failures; it leads toward the desired goal of zero safety incidents in the work place, similar to a “zero-defects” quality culture
